
'A VIEW FROM THE BOUNDARY' PART 2 BELTON & RIDLINGTON CRICKET CLUB ("The Foxes")

After a glorious victory at Uppingham in late May, we continued the good form in early June with a comfortable home victory against the Harborough Taverners in a low scoring encounter. After a week of considerable rain leading up to the match, the wicket resembled a soggy pudding of a pitch which made batting pretty difficult. After winning the toss, we elected to bat first and crawled our way to a disappointing score of 85 all out from 34 overs, with Guy Margetts (first appearance in 5 years – welcome back, we need you!) and Dave Fairley top scoring with 17 and 16 runs respectively. However, with ball in hand, we again bowled and fielded excellently and after 10 overs of the Taverners innings, the scoreboard read a remarkable 4 runs for 4 wickets with Paul Morton and Guy Margetts keeping things incredibly tight whilst making the opposition batsmen hop around in the crease on a somewhat unpredictable wicket. We eventually bowled the Taverners out for a meagre total of 48 ensuring victory by 37 runs and an early finish.

After an almost unprecedented two consecutive victories, we took to the field at home to a very keen and unbeaten Charnwood Casuals team, where every member of the opposition wore a traditional navy blue cap and took the game rather seriously. This level of professionalism failed to rub off on us though and having been put into bat, we were soon in all sorts of trouble on another testing batting wicket against some very good and accurate bowling. Only two of our players made it into double figures ('extras' were top scorer!) with Mick Wright making a patient 14 and Ben Kind scoring 11 in his first match of the season in a paltry total of just 75. However, some fine opening bowling from Paul Morton and Steve Fox (2 wickets each) soon had Charnwood in trouble at 28 for 4 wickets which included one of the 'champagne moments' of the season as Mick Wright took a sensational catch (not that he knew anything about it) when a hard hit shot nestled nicely between his upper thighs, approximately one inch below his manhood, preventing a very nasty incident indeed! Fortunately Mick, though with a higher pitched voice than usual, was still able to count to two but this was the last joy for us as Charnwood romped home to a comfortable 6 wicket victory.

On Sunday 13th July we made the short trip up to the lovely Uppingham CC ground in a marathon 40 overs fixture – to which both teams managed to bat all the way through – a very rare event! After winning the toss we elected to bowl and yet again bowled and fielded really well at the start restricting the home team to just 50 for 3 from the first 20 overs, with Dave Fairley, Will Bell and Paul Morton all bowling economically. Uppingham accelerated after the drinks break and finished on a very respectable 193 for 7 from their allotted 40 overs.

After another fine cricketing tea, opener Joe Pine from Ridlington got us off to a decent start scoring 31 brisk runs but after a mini collapse, at 42 for 3 we were in a spot of bother. However, a new Club record stand (and probably one that exceeds anything for several decades re Belton CC) of 92 runs for the 4th wicket from the 'father and son' partnership of skipper Steve Kind and 'young' Ben swung the match back in our favour and at 134 for 3, 60 runs were required off the last 9 overs. Ben batted quite beautifully for a stylish score of 51 but at times seemed to forget that his father was over 30 years older and running between the wickets became somewhat of a challenge for Kind Senior! However, with Ben falling to an excellent catch, the 'old man' soon followed him back to the pavilion for 38 in pursuit of quick runs and the momentum was lost. We eventually finished our 40 overs on a respectable 165 for 9 wickets, losing by 28 runs.
