HELP KEEP SOMEONE WARM THIS CHRISTMAS

For some older people, the Winter Fuel Payment is a life saver that enables them to pay higher fuel bills during the winter. For others it is nice to have, but not essential. Anyone living in the UK during September who was born before 5 July 1952 is eligible for a Winter Fuel Payment of between £!00 and £300 depending on age, and circumstances.

The High Sheriff of Rutland, Miles Williamson-Noble, says "For some years I have felt that I and others like me should try to use this payment to help those in greater need than ourselves. I have, therefore, started a High Sheriff of Rutland's Fund, which amongst its aims includes providing support for elderly people in Rutland suffering from isolation or poverty. The fund is eligible for Gift Aid, and for Government matched funding on any money invested for future use. I urge anyone who receives the Winter Fuel Payment, and who does not need it to pay their heating bills, to donate it to the High Sheriff's Fund, so that the money can be passed on to those elderly residents of Rutland in real need."

The trustees of the fund will be working with the Citizens Advice Bureau, Age UK and Charity Link to identify those in need. Parish Councils and Meetings may also nominate, in confidence, potential beneficiaries whom they think may not be known to the charities.

If you would like to contribute, you can do so either by making a payment online, or by sending a cheque. To pay online, go to www.llrcommunityfoundation.org.uk, click on Make a Donation Now, then Select One and highlight High Sheriff of Rutland Fund. To make a contribution by cheque make it out to High Sheriff of Rutland's Fund and post it to Leicestershire and Rutland Community Foundation, 3 Wycliffe Street, Leicester LA1 5LR. The Community Foundation can provide a Gift Aid mandate if you would like one.

The High Sheriff says "This is a great opportunity for those aged 62 or more to make a useful contribution and a difference to the lives of those less fortunate than themselves. Don't put it off for future consideration, but act as soon as you receive your Winter Fuel Payment."

Arteriosclerosis (build up of plaque in the arteries) - Do you want to know? Most doctors steer away from any seemingly healthy person doing any investigation into whether they have any plaque build up due to lack of knowledge in how to treat it. However there are many scientifically proven (around 20) risk factors for developing arteriosclerosis. Removing the risk factors and replacing with positive influences reverses plaque build up. Tests can help to provide the imputus to make the changes. There is not room here, this month, to list the risk factors. Maybe next month.


